Digital Corner



Some web addresses are quite long, full of random jumbles of characters. This doesn't matter when browsing the web normally, but it looks rather ugly when you want to share a link with someone. Some sites have a Share button which might provide a shorter link than what is in the URL bar. But oftentimes, you can shorten the URL yourself.

Many websites like Google, Amazon, and eBay have extra characters added to the URL which track where you came from, or what pages you have looked at previously. Those extra characters are often listed after a ? or a & symbol. Removing the characters after those symbols can let you shorten the URL. For instance, normal eBay URLs can be shortened from over 500 characters to just 37 by removing those trackers!

Be sure to test the shorter links before you share them to make sure they work!

Visiting Papua New Guinea

Your Windows 10 computer will keep functioning. It will not instantly become vulnerable. But any future vulnerabilities


Spiritual Thoughts
